

**50 confirmed cases of Influenza A (H1N1-2009)**

Singapore has confirmed 50 new cases (316th to 365th cases) of Influenza A (H1N1-2009) today, bringing the total tally to 365 confirmed cases. In addition to these 50 new cases, 48 other cases were pending investigation yesterday.

2 Of these 98 cases, 45 have been investigated, and they comprise 32 local cases, and 13 imported cases. The remaining 53 cases are still being investigated. There is a new cluster of three cases at Pulau Tekong Camp, all of whom are full-time national servicemen.

**Advisory**

4 With more local cases of infection appearing, it is important that all of us exercise good hygiene practices, such as covering the mouth when coughing and sneezing.
